The office collaborates with the campus community to create an institutional and community climate of social justice. We promote access and equity in higher education and offer programs that educate the campus about diversity. In addition, we incorporate student learning and development; enhance student overall educational experiences; provide access to academic, social, cultural, recreational and other group activities; and provide opportunities for intentional interaction and engagement. The Center for Global Engagement (www.fau.edu/global)

The Center for Global Engagement was established in 2016 as a hub for international activities and global engagement efforts and in support of the Global Perspectives and Participation platform of the university strategic plan. The unit reports to the Provost's Office and to the Division of Student Affairs and Enrollment Management. The Center for Global Engagement supports the development, promotion, and advocacy for a globally diverse university community and culture, by fostering an inclusive and supportive environment through innovative global exchange, competence, and outreach.

Education Abroad: Formerly known as the Office of International Programs, FAU Education Abroad coordinates long and short-term study abroad programming, manages the University's international agreements and partnerships, and represents FAU within the field of international education. FAU Education Abroad administers and oversees credit-bearing study abroad programming and provides general support services to students engaging in University-affiliated travel abroad. FAU Education Abroad advises students and faculty on fellowship and grant opportunities for overseas study and research; it also coordinates activities for the Peace Corps Prep Certificate Program.

International Services: The office is responsible for providing a full suite of support services to international students, scholars and their dependents. These services include issuance of forms I-20 and DS-2019 for F and J visa non-immigrant visa holders, reporting and record maintenance in SEVIS (Student and Exchange Visitor Information System), providing pre-arrival and onboarding support to international

students, implementing programs and activities that support cultural adjustment and transition to life in the U.S., and signature events such as International Education Week and the Festival of Nations. The office is also responsible for the International Integration Initiative (I3 @ FAU), which facilitates integration of international students into FAU campus life, and targets programming that allows U.S. and international student opportunities for learning and interactions.

Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution (www.fau.edu/studentconduct)

The purpose of the Office for Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution is to support the educational mission of the University by administering the Student Code of Conduct (www.fau.edu/regulations/chapter4/REGULATION%204.007_6.17.14. pdf) and serving as a resource to the university community. The mission of the Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution is to promote a safe and secure university community of civility, integrity, and student learning and development, as well as responsible, healthy behavior.

The Daniel B. Weppner Center, also known as Lead and Serve, invests in students to become change agents. Lead and Serve is committed to providing an atmosphere that fosters learning, personal growth, and exploration of individual and group leadership and service skills. Lead and Serve offers many opportunities to enhance a student's experience both in and out of the classroom. Through partnerships with Academic Affairs, offerings such as Academic Service-Learning and the Leadership Studies Minor with related courses, such as LDR 2010: Introduction to Leadership, are offered to students. Additionally, faculty and students have the opportunity to combine coursework with the needs of the community and practice leadership through action by engaging in Academic Service-Learning courses. Through the integration of instruction, servant leadership and reflection, learning becomes more personally meaningful. Our co-curricular opportunities consist of many programs such as the iLead Student Leadership Conference, Days of Service, the Elite Owl/Red Jacket Leadership and Service Ambassadors, certificate programs, customized workshops for students and non-students, mentoring and more.

Volunteer hours served at any nonprofit agency while an FAU student is currently enrolled can be recorded on the student's transcript through NobleHour. Lead and Serve also advises the Student Government program Students Advocating Volunteer Involvement (SAVI), which provides students with service opportunities benefitting surrounding communities.

CLASS, under the Division of Undergraduate Studies, coordinates:

- Learning Communities (LC): The Learning Community program on the Boca Raton campus offers incoming freshmen the unique and engaging opportunity to enroll in courses with 20-24 incoming freshmen with similar academic goals and interests.
- 2. Supplemental Instruction (SI): A series of weekly study sessions for students taking historically difficult courses. SI is open to all students who want to improve their understanding of course material and improve their grades. Attendance is voluntary. SI is a chance to get together with people in the class to compare notes, to discuss important concepts, to develop strategies for studying and learning the subject and to test themselves before the professor does.
- 3. Tutoring programs: CLASS Tutoring Services provides free group tutoring by peer tutors in content-area courses. Peer tutors help improve performance in a difficult course by modeling effective study techniques and breaking down difficult concepts. Peer tutors are successful students who have earned at least an "A-" in the courses they tutor, have been recommended by their professors and have been trained in tutoring techniques through the tutor training program.
- eLearning: The eLearning academic support services provides students with resources to facilitate a successful online learning experience. The focus is to assist students with the integration of technology into fully online courses.

CLASS is located within the Center for Teaching and Learning in General Classroom South (GS-2, room 223). Because the Ombuds reports to the President's Office, the Ombuds has access to information from any office within the institution. The Ombuds works toward an informal resolution of issues, provides coaching, and option development. The office is informal and does not generate records, take legal notice nor accept official complaints; however, the office can assist you by making appropriate referrals if this is your intent. Your visit to the Ombuds is confidential except when there is a concern about danger to you, to others or in cases of Title IX matters. If, as an aid

to resolution, it is necessary to disclose your identity and your specific issue to gain essential information, you and the Ombuds will discuss this and determine the limits of confidentiality. You should visit the Office of the Ombuds if you need assistance with disputes about fees, academic concerns, grade reviews, housing issues, parking problems, red tape, and many other matters.

The Ombuds may help you to identify and evaluate options, to formulate a plan to address your issue, to find the correct person to address your concern, or to explain University regulations or policies. The Ombuds will listen to you. An appointment

Office of Undergraduate Research and Inquiry (OURI) (www.fau.edu/ouri)

The Wimberly Library is a 165,000-square-foot building in the heart of the Boca Raton campus that serves over 900,000 visitors annually. It provides student group study rooms, a graduate study lounge, study carrels, seating for approximately 1,239, an electronic classroom, facilities for individuals with disabilities, an audiovisual media center and three computer labs. In addition to the computers available for use throughout the library, the entire building is equipped for laptop wireless connectivity. Reference assistance is offered in person or by telephone, email, chat or text.

The University Libraries' extensive holdings of approximately 3.7 million items include books, periodicals, government documents, microforms, maps, media and unique special collections in book arts, American Revolutionary War and Civil War documents, print and recorded music, rare books and manuscripts, and archival materials. The libraries also provide remote access to electronic resources including over 100,000 full-text electronic journals, more than 580 electronic databases, streaming videos, e-books and more.

Libraries and the other 11 Florida public university libraries. Through memberships in the Southeast Florida Library Information Network (SEFLIN) and the Center for Research Libraries (CRL), the collections of area libraries and the CRL are available to FAU students, faculty and staff. Research materials, both digital and hard copy, not available in the FAU Libraries' collection may be obtained locally, nationally, and globally through interlibrary loan.
